“Let’s go with God game time” allows us to be our best and most knowledgeable everywhere, because we are with the all-knowing, ever-present, everywhere God. Therefore, each moment with God becomes an expressive, vibrating, everlasting victory celebration.

When we hear the words “game time,” our natural reaction is to “do our best,” “do what we were trained to do,” or “get it done.” But when “game time” becomes “let’s go with God game time,” it becomes a time of meaningful awareness of always being alive and together with Him. This same readiness, excitement, and mentality is connected to God’s omnipresence and omniscience, as demonstrated in Psalm 139:1-3, 7-10.

My professional sports career was full of “let’s go with God game time.” Mark 6:7 (NIV) states, **“Calling the Twelve to him, he began to send them out two by two.”** God is a team player. In my continuous childhood conversations with God, I expressed to Him, “I get the team concept and really like it, but do You realize You are having me excel in singles’ tennis? I am winning juniors, college age, and adult pro tennis tournaments in singles as a kid. Who is that helping besides me?”

Yes, there were times when deafening silence to this question prevailed, but thankfully, only momentarily. A few days, weeks, or months with no answer to a kid like me simply meant to persistently engage, seek, and continue in wonderment, adoration, and perseverance. I just continued to prevail with questions, conversations, devotion to service, and the idea of contributing to the greater whole, for and with God.

Then, sure enough, opportunities presented themselves. An opponent from a war-torn country arose in my section of the draw, allowing for the perfect stage on a well-known court where it was believed that top seeds often tumbled for superstitious reasons.

It was a heavenly message for me when numerous articles were written about the most prestigious grass

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court tennis venue ever created for tennis announced a certain player who carried the weight of a struggling nation at war on her shoulders. She was my next opponent, on a court which many superstitiously felt advantageous to underdogs, and I was no underdog. God provided a choice scenario for me at that exact “let’s go with God game time.”

In this case and in many others, situations materialized in pro tennis of which I took full advantage. I had complete assurance of what victory looked like, because God and the universe had shown it to me. The victory leap of that player after match point and her country’s proud newspaper headlines with something to cheer about in war still resonate with me to this day. It was a special match and a victory for all, a story not told then and never revealed in detail until now. I guess we all have our own viewpoints of what “let’s go with God game time” looks like.

Looking closer at current sports, estimates have Super Bowl global viewership between 800 million and 1 billion, in 130 countries and 30 languages. The estimated price tag for a 2023 Super Bowl commercial is \$7 million for a 30-second spot. Repeatedly, in such iconic environments, players achieving mind-boggling plays, defining moments,

or scores often give the physical appearance of “giving glory to God.”

They will be in good company, since two new Super Bowl ads this year will make the bold move to feature Jesus. The “He Gets Us” campaign came with a hefty price, which certainly will have naysayers asking, “Why here?” On the other hand, “Thank goodness this is here rather than one more pharmaceutical commercial,” right? Personally, I can get my God infusions from other places than TV commercials. The same is true if the need ever arose for a medical prescription. Still, I’m glad the “He Gets Us” campaign is available to viewers, because it represents a gratitude reminder and pattern interrupt to reflect, remember, and further connect with God. These are important.

Gratitude reminders have no seasonal boundaries. I am grateful my humanitarian efforts are suited and in sync with “let’s go with God game time.” Most kingdom victories, whether humanitarian or in sports, for the most part, go unnoticed yet are registered in full detail in the Book of Life.

It took twenty-five years for a sports reporter to ask me this question at a Grand Slam televised final: “Did you give your all in that final?” I figured the reporter had done his homework, had a job to ask that question, found me, and even presumed the answer. So, I provided a summary: “I give my all for God. Always do.” Even when I stumble or fall, God is always there, ready again, and we partner up for “let’s go with God game time.” In my life, this is always.

Personal bests are unique to each of us. They are filled with the miraculous. Whether kept private or publicly announced, it can be perplexing to outsiders when one avoids the normal standard to win at all costs. However, for those with tendencies to be drawn to kingdom glory, giving one’s all always, for God’s use and purposes, becomes second nature. It becomes as natural as breathing, whether understood by others or not.

I Corinthians 3:9 says, **“For we are co-workers in God’s service; you are God’s field, God’s building.”** Time is man-made, but “let’s go with God” is about God inviting us to join Him forever.

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I look forward to what God has planned daily. Sports are still a glorious part of my life. I am honored and excited that Little Star Foundation currently has three Super Bowl-related programs running to help children with cancer, due to the generosity of the NFL. From Peyton and Eli Manning coaching the Pro Bowl teams in Las Vegas, to the Lombardi trophy festivities for Super Bowl LVII in Phoenix, and ad campaigns widening our appeal, this is an excellent time to reflect on teamwork and “let’s go with God game time!”

The Super Bowl is exciting to watch. The game, halftime show, and commercials each have their role as part of the festivities and traditions. Excitedly, celebrations and connection with God are never once a year but every day and every moment.

Being on God’s team is available for everyone since we are all God’s children. Humanity plus God equals “let’s go with God game time!” I’m in, always and eternally. I look forward to being on God’s team with you, a team that is connected year round. Divine victory is assured; even if it is not revealed at first or second glance, it always is. 🙏
